OUR MISSION Community Funded Journalism

The Dallas Morning News is launching community funded journalism, an initiative that will produce in-depth stories and data insights to illuminate progress while identifying remaining challenges within the North Texas education-to-workforce pipeline.







OVERVIEW

Community Funded Journalism

Community funded journalism is an initiative to raise funding from corporations, foundations and philanthropists.

The initiative will:

- Support solutions-based journalism
- Drive social impact by deepening coverage
- Emphasize the values of diversity and inclusion to reflect the entire community
- Foster conversation about urgent public issues

Approximately a dozen news outlets have launched similar initiatives.



- **Digital disruption**, demographic shifts and economic pressures are changing how people consume news.
- **News deserts** are emerging nationally.
 - We have the second largest newsroom in the state, but our resources only allow for two full-time journalists and one part-time editor covering education.
 - Fifteen years ago, the education team was far larger, with 10 journalists.
- Community funded journalism will serve as a bridge to restore coverage that is shrinking, supporting journalism on topics of **highest public importance**.

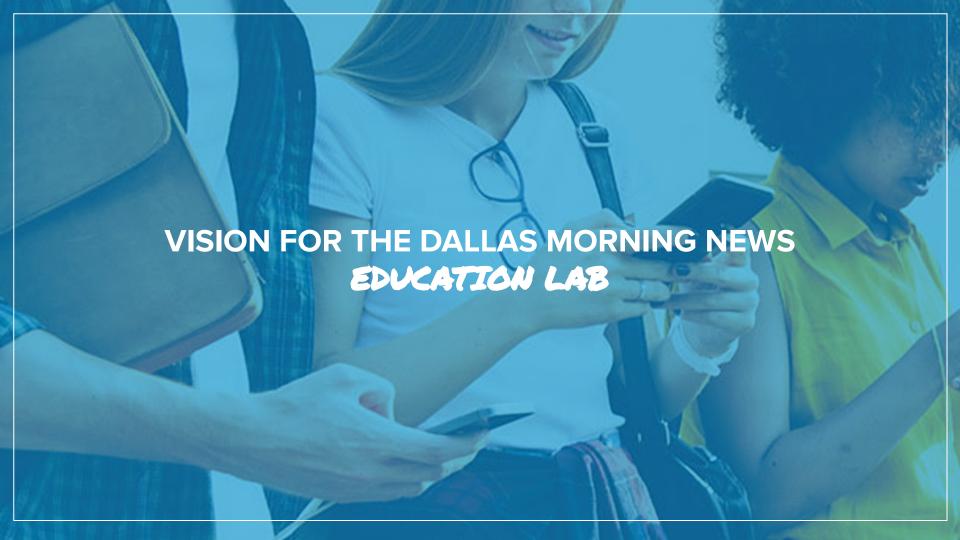

With additional resources, *The Dallas Morning News* will significantly enhance the following approaches to reporting and editing as well as engaging with our audience.



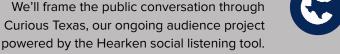
WATCHDOG AND ENTERPRISE JOURNALISM

We'll produce watchdog stories that scrutinize how government spends money on our students. Enterprise stories will explain education trends.



SOLUTIONS-ORIENTED STORIES

We'll report on programs in Texas and across the country that offer real solutions to our region and state's education problems.



COMMUNITY EVENTS

We'll organize expert panel discussions, community conversations and forums to spark civic interest in education issues.



DATA JOURNALISM

We'll create data-driven graphics and interactives produced by our data journalism team. We'll also make credible data available to the public.



A group of education thought leaders will provide feedback on coverage, give Q&A interviews for stories and take part in DMN events.





WHY... Focus on Education?

Equal access to quality education — from early childhood through college-level and workforce training — is key to the health of the city and its business competitiveness.

The Lab will cover education through a North Texas lens, including Dallas, hailed by state leaders for academic gains. Citizens, educators and policy makers could learn from what's working here:

- The Legislature's commitment to infuse schools with \$6.5 billion over two years presents a significant opportunity.
- Dallas ISD showed improvement in the state's A-F ratings.
- The district's ACE program reduced the number of schools failing state standards from 43 to 4.
- In Dallas County, 47% of eligible 3- and 4-year-olds enrolled in public pre-K, an increase of 12% since 2012.
- DCCCD's Dallas Promise program pledged free community college tuition to 16,200 students at 43 schools.

TEXAS EDUCATION STATISTICS



Educated 10% of the Country's Children

In 2018, Texas was responsible for educating 10% of the children in the country.



Graded "F" on School Finance Report

Across four spending indicators, Texas scores an "F" ranking 43rd in the nation in school finance.



Ranked 45 in Spending Per Student

In the recent past, Texas was in the nation's bottom tier of school funding, ranking 45th in spending per student in 2015.



\$2,300 Less Spending Per Student

NEA reports that spending per pupil was \$2,300 less than the national average for the 2017/18 school year.

ON JOURNALISTIC INDEPENDENCE

- The Dallas Morning News will not accept any donations that might jeopardize the editorial independence of the news organization. In addition, donations to The Dallas Morning News must be for a public purpose and to advance its mission and strategic objectives. Quid pro quo donations will not be accepted. For transparency, the News cannot accept anonymous donations.
- Funders are not aware of specific stories the newsroom is working on and do not review them before publication. Funders do not have special or privileged access to reporters.
- Editors and reporters operate independently of our funders and maintain editorial control over content.
- Editorial function and news coverage of any funded project shall at all times remain independent of the donor and of any institution, and no attempt shall be made to influence or interfere with the editorial policies or decisions of any funded
- This initiative is 100% non-profit. We will be good stewards of the funding, ensuring that all of the fund supports the education team's salaries, travel expenses and employee benefits, as well as community events that deepen public conversation on important education issues.



PUBLIC IMPACT REPORTS

To quantify audience and community engagement, *The Dallas Morning News* will provide quarterly impact reports detailing key metrics and goals, including:

- The number of enterprise stories published quarterly and annually
- Digital metrics including page views, users, returns visits and total engaged minutes
- Attendance at DMN community engagement events across Dallas and Fort Worth
- Track references to DMN Education Lab stories by policy makers



EFFECTIVE COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

- Vote About It was a highly successful campaign geared to raise political awareness and eliminate voter apathy in North Texas.
 - This campaign contributed to a 3% increase in Dallas voter turnout during the March 2019 mayoral election.
- **Duets** is a public conversation series that pairs a *Dallas Morning News* journalist with an interesting, influential person who has a Dallas or Texas tie.
 - Speakers engage in an unscripted, wide-ranging, free-wheeling conversation.
 - We've hosted more than a dozen conversations in the DMN auditorium and at the Dallas Public Library, the Dallas Institute of Humanities and the Dallas Holocaust and Human Rights Museum.
